

Continuous evaluation of the students is done through class tests. Two common internal examinations are conducted per semester and the internal marks are published. Class-wise PTA meetings are convened after internal examinations and the parents are informed about the progress of their wards. ## **Criterion – VI**

### 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

### VISION OF THE COLLEGE

• "Empowerment through Uncompromising Quality Education" is the vision of our institution. The prime endeavour of the institution is the empowerment of society, especially the socially and economically backward community of the area through knowledge and to equip it to face the challenges and needs of emerging world.

### MISSION OF THE COLLEGE:

The College has a peaceful rural locale which provides an optimal environment to enable achievement of the set forth vision and mission. The major ones include

- To empower the students through uninterrupted quality teaching and learning methods whereby their ineptitude arising from intellectual and emotional imbalance is replaced by coherent and consistent understanding of the self which enables each to be a responsible stake holder.
- To provide ample exposure to the student community to issues highlighting the need to be well aware of the importance of national integration, communal harmony and campus peace and to mould them in such a way that they offer all kinds of assistance in meeting the immediate needs of their neighbourhood and its people who belongs to an extremely backward area
- 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System



- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
  - 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curriculum development is directly under the control of the University of Calicut. Some of our teachers serve as members of the Board of Studies that design curriculum from time to time.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

We strongly believe that teaching and learning is done better in an ideal atmosphere which is neither teacher centred nor learner centred but learning centred. Here, the interaction that takes place inside as well as outside the class rooms matters and in doing so, both the teacher and the student transcend all barriers of communication and simultaneously do away with stereotypes. All novel methods to which the teacher gets exposed through orientation and refresher programmes are utilised in the production and transmission of knowledge with the help of a mini-max strategy, where maximum utilisation of minimum resource is ensured. Not being egoistic the teachers of this institution are not hesitant in seeking the helping hand from experts and eminent faculty members within and outside the university who differ in style and expression and contribute to the learning process by offering invited talks based on topics suggested by students as well.

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Internal examinations conducted twice during each semester forms a major part of the continuous comprehensive evaluation of students. The college council nominates a co-ordinator for the overall supervision and preparation of schedule of these examinations. The time frame for valuation and submission of mark list by Departments is set by the co-ordinator in consultation with the principal who makes sure that each Department convened the respective class PTA s for conveying the marks scored by the students and for providing and inviting suggestions from the parents concerned. The feedback from the parents is discussed at the college PTA general body and executive meetings which initiates positive steps for generously remunerating the guest faculty members who form a chunk of this institution. The practice of holding periodic tutorial meetings add to fervour in teacher-student relationship and this dissolves the tension among students whose problems are identified and handled both collectively and severely and, as a result, they tend to approach ensuing examination with an ease never shown before and come out in flying colours at the end of the programme.

### 6.3.4 Research and Development

A Research Committee to co-ordinates and motivates research ambience of the college with active support from IQAC. Teachers are encouraged to take up major and minor projects. Scrutiny of the project proposals submitted by faculty members is done by the research committee. Due support is rendered to faculty members in pursuing Ph.D and higher education, participating in seminars and publishing papers.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

In spite of an acute space shortage, the college library has an adequate supply of recent books. New books and journals are added every year. Computerisation of library is under completion. In addition to the common library, most of the departments are having their own department libraries which provide students to access the books with much ease. Most of the Departments are also provided with internet facility to which students are also given access.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The Principal with the involvement of college council analyses the existing staff pattern and takes necessary steps for the recruitment of guest personnel as per the requirement. Reconstitution of various committees and clubs are done at the beginning of each academic year to ensure efficient functioning. New recruits are accommodated into the system through in-house training. Various recreation programmes organised by the staff club on various occasions alleviates the strain of a hectic work calendar and preserves a co-ordial working atmosphere.

### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Vacancy positions are intimated to the management in due time. Appointment is done by the management in compliance with the regulations of the University and concurrence of the State Government. Cases of unfilled vacancy are met by temporary appointment done strictly on merit basis after advertising in leading newspapers.

### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

An amiable association is maintained with selected industrial firms whereby the students get an opportunity to do their project works. Industrial visit as prescribed in the curriculum by different board of studies makes it inevitable to maintain our link and collaboration with industries. This also helps our students to procure jobs after course completion.

### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admission of students is done strictly on the basis of merit and reservation policies followed by the Government as well as the University. Admission to both U.G and P.G courses was through a single window system operated by University. An admission committee involving the Principal and the Heads of various Departments supervises the smooth admission procedure in the college with active support from the non-teaching staff. The admissions under community, sports and management vacancies are also completed ensuring transparency.




