3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social responsibility

N.S.S played a major role in creating awareness on drug abuse, blood donation and campus cleanliness among students. Visit to Kalchady adivasi colony and voluntary service was undertaken under the auspices of N.S.S. An AIDS awareness rally and public meeting was organised by N.S.S to alert the local community. An Eye check up camp and an awareness class about common eye diseases was arranged in collaboration with Trinity Eye Hospital, Palakkad for the students. The World Environment day and Ozone Day are observed by the nature club by planting trees and creating alertness among students for minimising plastic wastes. Due support was given to N.S.S and N.C.C by the college and entire students participated in the clean campus mission through the Compulsory Social Service (CSS) Scheme enforced by the University. Selected N.S.S volunteers extended their help in the smooth conducting of Alathur Sub-district School Shasthrolsavam. A series of career orientation programmes and personality development classes were arranged by the career guidance and counselling cell for the general benefit of the student community. Placement cell took initiative in arranging recruitment sessions for the final year students and around 12 students got campus placement. Essay, photography and painting competitions were arranged during different occasions for fostering the inborn talents in students. College Union actively undertook the endeavour of helping the poor and needy by visiting old age homes and orphanage s with a supply of food and dress materials. Legal awareness programme regarding domestic violence against women was arranged.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college being affiliated to the University of Calicut, the curriculum for the different programmes are developed and approved by the respective bodies of the University.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college seminar hall is equipped with the latest audio-visual systems. The faculty members make use of the facility to the maximum extent possible. Seminars and workshops are arranged at regular intervals for the academic upgrading of both teachers and students. PG students are encouraged to attend seminars organised by nearby institutions. Ample opportunity is provided to the students for carrying out their project works in prestigious institutions and industries which helps them in getting hands own experience with latest technology

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Class tests are conducted by the concerned teachers frequently and the weak students are given extra care. IQAC ensures the conducting of two internal examinations as per the University criteria under the supervision of the Examination Committee and Academic Audit cell. Class PTA meetings are conducted in each semester to update the parents about the progress of their wards. Tutorial system facilitates better teacher-students interaction and provides a complete overview of the students to the concerned tutors. All these channel the students to take up the external examination conducted by the University with due confidence.

6.3.4 Research and Development

A Research Committee to co-ordinates and motivates research ambience of the college with active support from IQAC. Teachers are encouraged to take up major and minor projects. Scrutiny of the project proposals submitted by faculty members is done by the research committee. Due support is rendered to faculty members in pursuing Ph.D and higher education, participating in seminars and publishing papers.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

In spite of an acute space shortage, the college library has an adequate supply of recent books. New books and journals are added every year. Computerisation of library is under completion. In addition to the common library, most of the departments are having their own department libraries which enables the students to access the books with much ease. Most of the Departments are also provided with internet facility to which students are also given access.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The Principal with the involvement of college council analyses the existing staff pattern and takes necessary steps for the recruitment of guest personnel as per the requirement. Reconstitution of various committees and clubs are done at the beginning of each academic year to ensure efficient functioning. New recruits are accommodated into the system through in-house training. Various recreation programmes organised by the staff club on various occasions alleviates the strain of a hectic work calendar and preserves a co-ordial working atmosphere.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Vacancy positions are intimated to the management in due time. Appointment is done by the management in compliance with the regulations of the University and concurrence of the State Government. Cases of unfilled vacancy are met by temporary appointment done strictly on merit basis after advertising in leading newspapers.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

A co-ordial association is sustained with selected industrial firms whereby the students get an opportunity to do their project works. Industrial visit as prescribed in the curriculum by different board of studies makes it inevitable to maintain our link and collaboration with industries. This also helps our students to procure jobs after course completion.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admission of students is done strictly on the basis of merit and reservation policies followed by the Government as well as the University. Admission to both U.G and P.G courses was through a single window system operated by University. An admission committee involving the Principal and the Heads of various Departments supervises the smooth admission procedure in the college with active support from the non-teaching staff. The admissions under community, sports and management vacancies are also completed ensuring transparency.

Examination is conducted as per the instructions from the University at the end of each semester. IQAC and the Academic Audit Cell ensures completion of the syllabus and internal examinations before the commencement of the final examination

6.10 What efforts are made by the University to promote autonomy in the affiliated/constituent colleges?

Autonomy is granted by the State Government as per the recommendation of the University and UGC expert Committee.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

The Alumni association helps in channelizing and transforming the goodwill of the Alumni into creative and meaningful co-existence. Financial and moral support is rendered by the alumni in the functioning of the institution.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

PTA is a statutory body with principal as the President and elected member from the parent as Vice-president. General body meeting is convened on an annual basis. An executive committee with elected members from the staff and parents meets occasionally to discuss financial as well as any other matters of timely relevance. PTA plays a key role in the day-to-day activities of the college by closely monitoring the academic and infra-structural requirements and providing timely financial and moral support. PTA also provides endowments to the toppers in the University Examinations each year.

The newly recruited personnel are equipped through in-house training. The staff also attend the training programmes conducted by the Academic Staff College of the University.





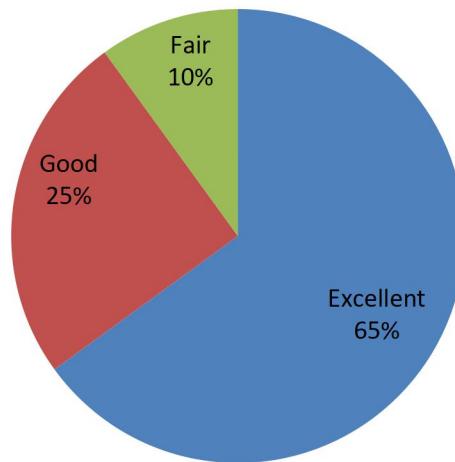
